Despite real progress (reducing sulfur, lowering nutrient levels) the Baltic Sea still faces multiple challenges: eutrophication, plastic debris, warming waters and depleted fish stocks. Unless we accelerate action, parts of the system could reach thresholds that make recovery far harder.

Every policy must rest on frontier science and needs ways of conveying that knowledge vivid enough to move people beyond expert circles. Scientists trace the hazards; artists translate them into feelings that travel. That synergy frames the question scientists, artists and policymakers will tackle:

How do evidence and emotion join forces to spark action for the Baltic Sea?


